LETTER FROM THE MANSE

Friends,

It's been another busy but fruitful year in Sydenham. As always there is a lot going on, and that means that lots of people are serving, in lots of different ways, within the life of the church.

At the beginning of this letter, I want to publicly say thank you to all those who serve in whatever way, as you play your part in building for God's Kingdom.

This year has seen some changes in staff and in leadership. We welcomed **Emma-Jayne Speers**, who joined us in early December, as our Community & Family Worker.

Sammy Stanfield has been the Youth Worker in Sydenham for 14 years, but, as a part-time teacher, has decided to accept a full-time post, so will be leaving his employment with us the end of August this year. However, as a family the Stanfields expect to remain part of our congregation, so we won't be saying goodbye to them. I want to acknowledge Sammy's wonderful service amongst us and say a personal thank you to him for his friendship and his leadership.

At the time of writing, Council is giving prayerful consideration to the future work of **Vocational Lay Employees**, to discern how best to use resources for the work in our church. To this end Council have had 3 special meetings, 2 of which facilitated by Leanne Hill from IMYC, who enabled us to reflect upon our programmes and our ethos.

At the New Year we had a change of Circuit Stewards as **Carolyn Hall** completed her 3- year term in office. I want to formally say thank you to her for her gracious wisdom and for her leadership. And now we welcome **Ruth Boyce** on board as Circuit Steward.

Reflecting upon the spiritual life of our congregation, it has been encouraging to see that the numbers of those involved with our **midweek Bible Study/Prayer evenings** and our **Life Together Groups** have slightly increased. This shows me that there is a hunger for people to grow in their faith and to support each other. I know that with 60 people on our prayer network, that our **prayer ministry** is of great encouragement especially to those who are in need.

This year has also seen a first - a Catholic priest preaching in Sydenham Methodist. In January, during the Week of Prayer for Christian Unity, we were again delighted to welcome the **Unity Pilgrims from Clonard Monastery.** I invited Fr Ciaran O'Callaghan to preach and it was a magnificent sermon! I know that they deeply appreciated the warm welcome they received.

Our **United Worship** with our friends from Strand Presbyterian continues monthly and at Christmas and Holy Week/ Easter. We were blessed to have the **Rev Dr Janet Unsworth** as the guest preacher at our Holy Week/Easter united services.

On Easter Day we were delighted to confirm 4 young people as they publicly professed their faith in Christ. We continue to seek to show **God's love to our community** through the likes of Coffee Kindness, Messy Church, Little Stars and our Uniformed Organisations.

This year we celebrated 90 years of our Girls' Brigade company, and formally thanked **Ann Anderson, Sam Anderson & Pat Gordon** who retired from their roles in Scouting after a combined over 100 years of service! And many people exercise their ministry outside of the 4 walls of the church - through the likes of **City Centre Chaplaincy, Street Pastors or SOS Bus.** It is my prayer that wherever you exercise your ministry, that the Lord will encourage you by his Spirit and through his people.

Our **Church website** has undergone an overhaul and is ready to view at the usual website address of <u>www.sydenhammethodist.org</u>. I am grateful for the work that **Susanne Bryans** has done and continues to do with the website. We have sought to make it more user friendly and more modern looking. I invite you to keep up to date with church life through this website.

At a **Connexional level**, this July sees some new structures with our current 8 Districts being amalgamated into 3 Districts, each with a fulltime District Superintendent. As the MCI website put it: Having full-time District Superintendents will mean that, for the first time, we will have a person in each district whose sole job and permanent full-time focus will be on supporting and enabling local churches to fulfil their visions for mission. This should help us all to bring a greater focus to our mission work, to grow and learn together, and to operate on a Connexional basis in a more coordinated manner.

It should also mean that individual circuit superintendents and ministers are freed from some of their administrative burdens and committee obligations, thus enabling them to focus more clearly on the core work of mission in their communities. The primary focus of the DS is to serve the MCI by 'encouraging, enabling, coordinating and implementing the Church's vision for missional discipleship'. The new structures are being 5

introduced in the context of both a renewed emphasis on mission within our church, and the reality that we face significant challenges in that, overall, our church is facing a decline in numbers and effectiveness. The new DSs will be firmly focussed on these two areas while proactively seeking opportunities for mission and witness. The DS for the Southern District will be the **Rev. Andrew Dougherty**; the DS for the North Western District will be the **Rev Dr Stephen Skuce**; and the DS for the North Eastern District will be the **Rev Philip Agnew**.

Also, during this year, **Peter Morris** was accepted as a student for the ordained ministry and so we will formally lose Peter to College as he begins his training and formation. We pray for Peter, Faith & Junia as they begin this new chapter in life within the church.

We are delighted to see our young people growing in faith and wanting to exercise a ministry.

We congratulate **Sara Fullerton** who has been chosen to serve in Team On Mission for the year. **TOM** is now 30 years old and during this time has afforded young people the opportunity to use their gifts and broaden their church horizons.

Please pray for Sara during this year.

In the church, it is natural to talk a lot about service and ministry (as I have done in this letter!!) but I leave you with an encouragement to **'rest' in Christ** - to allow the overwhelming love and grace of God to carry you along in life, as you worship and pray. May you know the Spirit of Christ with you each day. Blessings,

Sabbatical

There is a rhythm to ministry and part of that rhythm in the life of the church allows ministers to take sabbaticals. The rules of the sabbatical are, that a minister can take it after the first 10 years of ministry and then every 7 years after that. I am taking my sabbatical in August, September and October of this year, following my holiday in July. I am grateful that two of our retired ministers, Brian Fletcher and Ed McDade will oversee ministerial cover in my absence.

Subject to Conference, I will be appointed as Secretary of the Ordained Ministry Committee, so I will take my sabbatical to prepare for this Connexional role and to do some study on the nature of ordination and ministry in the future.

Brian will cover most Sundays during July and September, with Ed covering most Sundays during August and October. There won't be evening services in September and October, apart from united Services with Strand.

<u>Gift Aid</u>

Many of our members have signed a gift aid mandate and this enables the church to claim back the income tax that you paid before making your donations. This is a very valuable source of income to our church. Currently we receive back approximately £13500 each year from HMRC without our members giving anything extra. Not all members have taken the step of signing a mandate but if you are able to do this, it would be a great help to our finances. There is a stock of blank mandate forms on the vestibule table or from Derek Cottney.

Note that you must have paid an amount of income tax at least equal to what we claim off HMRC in that tax year.

Prayer Network

I cannot remember exactly the year our Prayer Network was formed but it must be over twenty years. This ministry has grown in the intervening years and each month we have an average of six to eight new requests for prayer, although as I write this article, we have had twelve requests. These have been for adults, young people and babies. It has been notable how many young people in their early teens have had serious illness to cope with. This must be a source of great stress both for the young people and their parents. We have also prayed for babies just a few months old who have had life changing health conditions. One baby in particular comes to mind, who was born prematurely weighing one and a half pounds and now in our latest update we were pleased to record that she now weighs over six pounds.

We are also aware of the number of people who have had to deal with bereavement. It is a privilege to be able to support in prayer, on a daily basis those who are ill and grieving because of the death of a loved one.

We don't know what lies ahead in each of our lives and what possible suffering we will have to face but we know that God, as promised, will be with us. We feel sure that with the support of our prayer partners this gives those who have requested prayer added strength to face their circumstances with courage and, by God's grace, will know His ever present help in times of trouble.

An update on prayer requests, which is issued at the beginning of each month often includes grateful thanks to those who have faithfully prayed for them or for the person for whom prayer was asked.

STREET PASTORS

We are ordinary Christians from many different churches and even nationalities!

Street Pastors is the church in action on the streets to care, listen and help.

We meet every Friday and Saturday evening at 10:45pm to pray and get our equipment ready (flip flops, first aid kits, water, gloves for bottles etc.)

Then we head out into the streets in teams of 1 or 2 whatever the weather and do the following:

- **pick up bottles** and broken glass (to prevent injury)
- Provide first aid.
- Give out flip flops,
- Calm anti-social behaviour,
- Provide a **listening ear**,
- Signpost to other help.
- Stay with vulnerable people until we are sure they have a safe way home.
- **Pray** for anyone who wants prayer, but we don't preach or push 'religion'
- **Report** needles left from drug use.

We normally get back to base at 2:30 or 3am, write up some notes, pray and go home. It is a long night which each person does once a month. Teams are now going into West, East Belfast and the parks to reach out to youth on the street.

I became a Street Pastor about a year and a half ago. It is a pleasure to serve God and help people who find life or a particular situation, difficult. We would value your prayers and any financial support since we are a charity.

Manse Report.

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I am a "Child of the Manse" and it is ironic that this year I was asked to be manse steward. I spent 21 years in manses north and south of the border, all big lovely homes; but homes which had to be maintained and looked after. One pleasing aspect is that in my day when a minister left one manse and joined another, the old inventory was brought out and everything checked off. If things were missing, the items had to be replaced by the minister. Thankfully this system has now gone which must be a relief to present day ministers. Still, the upkeep of these properties is up to the church, remembering of course that not only is this a family's home but also an asset belonging to the church. The mind set I use is; "Would I like to live here myself?"

As I have just only recently taken over this job, and so cannot give a yearly report, may I at this stage thank Neville Thomson & Ken McGuffin for the sterling work they have done in the previous three years to get the manse into good order and a credit to our church? Thank you Ken for your continued support. I have asked for your help a few times and you have never said no, so once again a big thank you from me.

A manse is not just a home but also a symbol of the church that is represents. If the manse is in a bad state of repair what sort of message does this give to not only neighbours but also to visitors, laymen and dignitaries? This is sometimes the first impression of our church that people needing help see and maybe the only time they will need the services of a minister, so the manse has to be presentable, welcoming and comforting to all at all time. To this end, my task is to ensure that the house becomes a home which is always fit to live in; so I like to think of it as my own. If there was something wrong with my own house, I would want to get it sorted, the only difference is that I am answerable to the Church Council and the minister for all the work which I sanction and is undertaken. Because I may think something needs doing, does not necessarily mean it will need to be done, and the minister/family is under the same constraints as I am. The Church Council, after discussion has the final say by vote. This does not mean to say that if an emergency arises; (hopefully never happen on my watch) that I cannot deal with this first and then seek the council's approval later.

I have had one official visit since January, which pointed out a few niggles. These have been sorted or are in the process of being done and I will do an informal back to front visit, when the last task to be done is complete. I have also "past" the house a few times just to check on the outside work, gutters, paint work fencing, etc. (someone is watching you Robin)



I am finding this rewarding to be able to do God's work in this small way. To be able to see achievements and goals set and realised but most of all, keep a home comfortable for our minister and his family to live and be happy in.

Report on Finance 2019

This year the opening balance in our **Circuit Account** was £13,859 and in our Property Account was £28,310.

There has been no major expenditure on property this year to date. The overall trend in these accounts shows that we are 'paying our way'. However, we are heavily reliant upon

Gift Aid which last year amounted to approximately £13,208.

So, while we can be pleased that

our income is covering our expenditure there would be a need for additional fundraising if we were to undertake any further major projects.

So far this year we have donated £478 to the WDRF cyclone Appeal and £370 to Play it by Ear for their work in bringing the Gospel to young people in a very visual way.

Our monthly joint services with Strand Presbyterian have so far this year, raised £772.45 for Christian Aid. Our church has also raised £856.98 **Believe In Life** during Christian Aid Week. Before Deat


My friend has two daughters who have done this same action by helping a young, abandoned mum with a new baby, bringing her into their homes and caring for her.

In Christ alone – who took on flesh, Fullness of God in helpless babe! This gift of love and righteousness, Scorned by the ones He came to save Till on that cross as Jesus died, The wrath of God was satisfied, For every sin on Him was laid; Here in the death of Christ I live.

As I reflect on these words, they show the divinity and at the same time the humanity of God when He came to earth and was born as a helpless babe. World Mission Partnership and World Development & Relief

In the Methodist Church in Ireland we have two organisations which help us get involved with God's mission in the wider world.

Firstly, we have WDR (World Development & Relief). Secondly, we have WMP (World Mission Partnership). Both organisations follow a strategy of working in partnership with groups that have local knowledge and expertise and share Methodist values.

In recent years, at our 'World' services, we have been very fortunate to be able to learn in more detail, from various guest speakers, about the work of some of our partners

At our annual WDR service in September,

Emma Dunwoody told us about a summer 2018 trip to South Africa by a group of Methodist young people.



PARTNERS IN CHANGE

The group was able to see the work of two of our WDR partners - Church Land Programme and Phakamisa.

Church Land Programme is concerned with fighting for those suffering from land injustice and establishing housing rights. Phakamisa respond to the needs of children and adults from poor communities, who are living with or impacted by HIV/AIDs through their uplifting and economically empowering programmes.

At our annual WMP service in February, Catherine Little from the Bible Society, one of the WMP partners, told us about the varied work they are involved in.

This includes distributing Bibles in detention centres in Austria and distributing Bibles among the many migrant workers in the Gulf states. Catherine also made us think about the availability of the Bible in different languages around the world.

The good thing about being involved with the various partners of WMP & WDR, is that we get to hear some of the detail and some of the stories about how God can use our support to make big impacts on lives.


We can find real encouragement in those stories to get involved and continue to be involved with the work of the Methodist Church in Ireland through WMP & WDP.

50 Breaking eggs



When I worked for Roads Service (now called Transport NI) I had a colleague whose favourite saying was "you can't make an omelette without breaking eggs". He used to say this every time we were about to do something new on the

road network. I certainly discovered the truth in that saying as we watched the effect on queues of traffic as new schemes bedded in. In Isaiah 43:19 we read God saying "see, I am doing a new thing!" Now Isaiah didn't mention breaking eggs, but in many ways, change can take a bit of getting used to until it settles down. As you may know our Church Council have been seeking the guidance of the Holy Spirit for our future mission - in particular our lay vocational employees and also the refurbishment of the vestibule to make it a more welcoming, brighter environment for both congregation and visitors alike and to open up its potential to facilitate other forms of ministry.

Two significant things have happened recently to focus our thinking.

First, after 14 years of much appreciated ministry, our Youth Pastor, Sammy Stanfield, has taken the opportunity to move from his part time teaching post to a full- time post. Robin has mentioned this elsewhere in this magazine however, I would just like to record grateful thanks to Sammy for his long years of faithful service leading our youth ministry. The second thing is that representatives from the Joseph Rank Trust visited our Church and have offered us a grant of £10,000 towards the cost of refurbishing the vestibule. This grant does, however, come with the conditions that we must have the scheme completed within 1 year – i.e. before the end of April 2020, and they will only pay out the funds when the work is complete. At the Church Council meeting on 6 June, gratitude was expressed to the Joseph Rank Trust for their generosity, and it was agreed that we should crack on with the work and not lose the opportunity of obtaining the grant. In addition, we are continuing to explore if other grant aid organisations would also be willing to support our project.

The vestibule refurbishment is really two schemes rolled into one, to minimise the disruption (the 'breaking eggs') and to ensure cost effectiveness in carrying out the work. One

aspect of the scheme is Health and Safety works as required by the Fire Authority, which includes the installation of emergency lighting and alarms, new fire safety doors at the foot of the stairs, the building-in of fire resistant storage under the stairs where the crèche equipment is currently stored.



The cost of these works is estimated at £22,000 incl. VAT which would not benefit from grant aid but thankfully we do have the necessary funding in the Property Account.

The second aspect of the scheme is to provide further enhancements during the time the Health and Safety works are on-going.

These will include new ceilings and lighting; new floor coverings; replacing the entrance doors into the church ; replacing the partition wall into the Taylor Room with new folding doors ; and replacement of the window panels in the entrance.



The estimated cost of these works is approx. £28,000. With the contribution of £10000 from Joseph Rank, it means our shortfall is currently £18,000. We are trying to reduce this further by seeking other grant aid. Ideally, we would like to obtain other grants to fully meet this £18,000 but there may be a shortfall. It is very likely that we will have to have a A Gift Day and/or interest free loans to help manage the payment of the work.

Thank you for the very generous way the work of our church is supported through the weekly giving. Unfortunately, the overall income figures did show a decrease of almost 5% last year, however, there were very understandable reasons for some of this decrease as people's circumstances change. Thank you to those who do review their giving from time to time – it is good practice and an example to all of us. We have a very faithful team who look after our finances. I would pay tribute to the meticulous work of our Treasurer, Gina Neill, Derek Cottney our Gift Aid Secretary and Alan Gray who looks after our weekly envelopes. If you would like further information on weekly giving or gift aid, please speak to any of these folk, myself or Robin our Minister.

The timescale to complete the vestibule works is very challenging. We will lose the £10,000 grant if the complete scheme is not finished by end of next April. Our intention would be to have a contract awarded towards the end of this year and a contractor starting work in early January. The estimated timescale for the work is 8 to 10 weeks. We are unlikely to lose the use of the church during this period, but the vestibule and Taylor Room will be 'out of bounds.' Groups that use the Taylor Room will be relocated to the Sam McGuffin room.


It does look like a period of disruption (breaking eggs!) ahead – which we will try to minimise and get the work completed as quickly as possible.

Youth Report 2018/19

This was another busy year in our youth ministry. **Focus**, our Sunday Bible class, continues to run during the latter part of our Sunday morning worship. We have been following an online programme run by Youth for Christ, which helps our young people engage with God's wisdom in a fun, relevant way.

During spring we ran **Membership classes** in place of Focus. Sessions included learning about God the Father; the life, death and resurrection of Jesus; the empowering Holy Spirit; the sacraments of Baptism and Communion; spiritual rhythms that draw us closer to God; and the exciting adventure of God's big picture, to which all of us are invited. We're delighted that **Amy Martin, Erin Armstrong**, and **Anna and Sam Rainey** entered Full Membership on Easter Sunday.



We continue to run several age-specific groups during the week, from age eleven upwards.

WNTMG runs every other Wednesday evening, and is a fun group for 11 – 14 year olds to make friends, eat food and learn about God. At this moment in time, one of the interesting characteristics of our church youth is that many are content in attending only one group or activity per week. There may be several reasons for this, but the important point is in realising that for many of our WNTMGERS, what happens on a Wednesday evening is the only church they experience. This year, we have been focusing on *grace*. Some of the young people's descriptions of grace have stayed with me: it's costly, it's a second chance, it's unowed (and yes, they made up that word!), and it's undeserved extravagant kindness.

Our **Cluster groups** continue to meet during each month. These are for young people and young adults, aged 14 and above. In the Guys' Cluster we have been studying the Enneagram this year. This is an ancient Christian personality typing model, which helps us to understand ourselves and others better. For centuries great Christian teachers have said that knowing yourself is just as important as knowing God. Hopefully by the end of this year we have learned a little more about what makes us- and others- tick! **Young Youngs**- our group for over 18s- has continued to run monthly. We alternate each month between having a social and studying a Christian teaching DVD together. Many of our young adults serve the church in different ways, so it's great to be able to provide them a space to not have to be a leader, unwind and just be themselves!

The Methodist Church in Ireland continues to run large events for different age groups and we love taking a group to them, as they help our young people to grasp that they are part of something bigger than our church. This year groups from our church attended **Autumn Soul** in Bangor, and **Soul Mates** in Lurgan. Autumn Soul always falls on the weekend that the clocks go back; I'm not sure having an extra hour lying on a church floor is a good or a bad thing! But what *is* a good thing is the opportunity to spend a weekend worshipping with our wonderful children and young people, eating together and wandering aimlessly with them around a mid-sized town, searching for pound shops on the Saturday afternoons!

A special thanks to all the leaders who give their time, energy and love to bless the children and young people in our church family. We couldn't function as a family without you.
